**2020 Vision** is <u>not</u> designed to give congregations more work - nor is it a plan for congregations "to adopt."

The context for **2020 VISION** is consistently following Jesus, the baptizer with the Spirit, and joining in God's mission in the world.

Engage the World





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
# RESOURCES

Lancaster Mennonite Conference leaders and congregations began a process in 2010 to discern where God is already at work in our midst and how we might partner as a fellowship of 170 congregations across seven states. The *We See Life* booklet (at upper right) was used as a tool to foster this year-long discussion across the conference.

In 2011, the discussion shifted from vision to sketching out a plan. Congregations and leaders began asking how to engage God's mission of reconciliation to the world over the next ten years? Where are the places God is appointing congregations to join in what God is already doing?

Now in 2012, we continue the discernment and conversation to specific and practical directions. With the power of the Holy Spirit, congregations are encouraged to shape measurable, intentional goals that will find specific applications in their context. This booklet gives you brief descriptions of values, plans, and intentional goals for our fellowship of congregations.

During 2012, congregations are encouraged to use John 15:1-17 as the **Dwelling in the Word Text** in a variety of ways in congregational life (preaching, Bible study, committee meetings, Sunday school, etc.)
