"Love your enemies." What does Jesus mean?

In this class, we will focus on Jesus' teaching in Matthew 5:43-48 on loving enemies, but also cover other relevant passages. How do you treat someone who cuts you off on the road? A neighbor who harasses you? Someone who threatens to kill a loved one? Your country's enemies in war? The case will be made that we cannot both love and kill an enemy. We will also examine what loving enemies looks like in real life and objections to this teaching.

Our primary focus will be biblical, but we will also look at the history of how this has been interpreted in the early church and at the time of the Reformation. Come with your curiosity and questions.

This course is part of a broader series of classes being developed on Anabaptist-Mennonite faith and practice. Classes will meet on Thursday

evenings from 6:30-8:05, with a five-minute break in the middle. The classes will run from March 4th through April 8th.

- 6:30-7:15 What if someone comes to my house and wants to hurt my family?
- 7:20-8:05 What did the early church believe about loving enemies? Can't there be a just war?

Class 4 - March 25

- 6:30-7:15 Doesn't Jesus just mean love our personal enemies? Can't you love someone and still kill them? Isn't Jesus' teaching just for certain Christians?
- 7:20-8:05 Can God's mind change from the Old Testament to the New Testament?

Class 5 - April 1

- 6:30-7:15 What about soldiers and rulers in the New Testament? What about Jesus cleansing the temple?
- 7:20-8:05 How can we overcome evil with good? Didn't Jesus tell the disciples to "buy a sword"? Didn't he say "I have come to bring a sword"?

Class 6 - April 8

- 6:30-7:15 Can we be good citizens while loving our enemies?
- 7:20-8:05 What about Hitler?
