KINGDOM MULTIPLICATION VISION UPDATE



The Anabaptist movement celebrates its 500th anniversary this year. In these five centuries, Anabaptist churches have been multiplied around the world, making it a truly global movement. In fact, current statistics from Mennonite World Conference show that there are 2.1 million baptized Anabaptist church members around the world.

Of that 2.1 million, only 28 percent of members are from the U.S. or Canada, and only 3 percent of members are from Europe. Perhaps you have heard these numbers before, or something similar. So, how did we get to this place today? There are a number of factors, but the greatest one is: The Holy Spirit's leading to share the gospel with people around the world.

For decades, EMM workers have played an important part in this global work of sharing the good news with people who have not heard it. We helped to multiply more than 20 Anabaptist networks of churches, but we have also joined in God's work in other churches beyond the Anabaptist tradition as part of this greater call to help people experience the hope of Jesus. This passion for seeing people come to know Jesus is rooted in John's vision from Revelation 7:9–10:

After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb."

John saw people from every nation. Every tribe. Every people group. Every language group. All of these people were praising God! This was not just a vision of what could be, but a vision of what will happen! God invites us to make this vision a reality.






INCOME BY SOURCE: \$6,431,978

Bangladesh Arsenic Mitigation Partnership: 2025 Report

We are a group of MCC Bangladesh alumni partnering with mission organization SIM Bangladesh to help the rural poor in the southern part of the country deal with the highest levels of drinking water arsenic found in the world, through their Arsenic Poisoning Prevention Program (APPP). The World Health Organization has identified arsenic in Bangladesh as the largest mass poisoning in human history.



Over the past year, funded in large part through our partnership, APPP has continued to grow:

- Over 1,100 arsenic education sessions held
- Over 2,600 arsenic water tests performed
- Over 1,100 household filters distributed
- Nearly 1,000 patients screened for arsenic poisoning symptoms
- Over 400 new arsenic poisoning patients admitted into the program. They will receive
 educational follow up, periodic testing of their filtered water, and medical care through APPP for
 at least 3 years.

In mid-March, we held our first community fundraiser at our home church in central Ohio. The evening included a soup & chili cookoff and other great food, Bangladeshi free-trade crafts bazaar, a variety of music, and a silent auction. Around \$15,000 was raised, all of which went directly to APPP.

Examples of what donated money does (US dollars):

- Annual screening for 10 patients: \$25
- Field kit to test 50 wells: \$70
- Household filters for 10 households: \$200 (each filter expected to last 5-10 years)
- Project worker monthly salary: \$300

Celebrating 59 years of service! We send greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to the Institutions, Agencies, Churches and people of LMC. The purpose of Cove Valley Christian Youth Camp is to provide a place and the opportunity for Christian teaching and fellowship along with wholesome and guided recreation in a spiritual atmosphere.

This summer was tied for the fourth highest summer since 1992 with 408 campers. Franklin District sent 66 campers or 16%. The theme this summer was "Fan into Flame the Gift of God". The good news is 10 made new commitments to Christ and started their new life at the camp. Other campers recommitted or made some other commitments to Christ (114). So many lives are changed at camp. It is a privilege to be a part of it.

Guest groups make up an important part of the ministry. God has brought new groups and new opportunities along so that His camp is being used to glorify Him. We depend on our guest group income to supply 10-12% of our summer camp support. A highlight was hosting Trail Life USA's regional ManCamp. Over 200 men and boys learned more about becoming a true Man of God.

Our adult retreats were a success this year. Roger Myers spoke at the Golden Age Retreat. It was good to see quite a few new faces. Delton Lehman ministered to the many families that came to Family Camp. It was great to see young families encouraging one another and see all the children that God is raising up for the next generation.

God has blessed us with a fine staff. Lynn Hanson is starting her 2nd year as Program Assistant, Amy Frey is in her 6th year as Food Service Director, Sarah Eshleman completed her 3rd year as Food Service Assistant, Paul Frey has kept the camp in great shape for 23 years as Maintenance Director and Eric Roth completed his 15th summer doing a fantastic job as Program Director. Darlene Shaffer has faithfully worked as our Housekeeper for 9 years in a part time capacity. I (Allen) completed my 29th year at the camp.

Moss Spring Campground has been added to the camp to allow for those who enjoy camping and would like to do so in a family friendly atmosphere. The campground currently has 12 sites with full hookups and a number of primitive sites. Private bathrooms with showers and a pavilion make an inviting area to have to meals or celebrate a special event. Nine groups and individuals enjoyed the grounds in its first year of operation.

The Board of Directors continues to seek God's guidance in making decisions for the camp. Jon Rotz, Charles Dean, Chad Wadel, Stephanie Smith and Peter Frey make up the Executive Committee. Other board members are David Cook, Royce Eby, Evan Dean, Hans Lehman, Delton Lehman, Scott Sollenberger and Devin Horst.

Nuestra organización buscó proporcionar apoyo financiero a los trabajadores civiles del Servicio Público cuando regresaban de sus asignaciones después de la Segunda Guerra Mundial. Esta colaboración creó una nueva forma para que los miembros de la iglesia llevaran a cabo la tradición anabautista de compartir las dificultades financieras entre sí a través de la ayuda mutua.

Everence ha seguido expandiendo y adaptando sus servicios para servir mejor a nuestros miembros y clientes. Hoy en día, Everence es una institución financiera de servicio completo y con una amplia gama de servicios. Servimos a más de 70,000 clientes y miembros a través de nuestro equipo nacional de profesionales financieros.

Aunque Everence y sus servicios han expandido a lo largo de los últimos 80 años, nos hemos mantenido comprometidos con nuestros valores originales de proveer ayuda mutua, mayordomía y servicio comunitario, porque creemos que todo lo que somos y todo lo que tenemos proviene de Dios.

A partir de 2021, más del 40% de las organizaciones religiosas reportaron desafíos en la gestión de sus fondos de dotación, lo que destaca la necesidad de una planificación financiera sostenible (National Philanthropic Trust, 2021). Si bien se esperan datos actualizados, esta tendencia pone énfasis en la importancia de que las iglesias gestionen activamente sus dotaciones para la estabilidad a largo plazo.

An exciting addition to the MCCL program for our 2024-2025 choir year was Musicianship Classes. Each week during rehearsal, singers in the auditioned choirs met in small groups for 15 minutes to focus on sight singing, rhythm reading, and music theory concepts.

We are thrilled to see growth and look forward to watching how these classes continue to increase MCCL singers' skills and confidence.

MCCL honors music as a gift from God by creating exceptional choral music, fostering community, and nurturing character. We equip children and youth for a lifetime of worship and service to the church and community through Christ-centered repertoire that both affirms Anabaptist beliefs and reflects the musical diversity of the church around the world and across time.



Support for Prison Ministries

Support for Prison Ministries chaplains at Lancaster County Prison (LCP) and the Youth Intervention Center (YIC) provides excellent service to the incarcerated inmates who are often very anxious to talk to one of the chaplains for a word of hope as they need encouragement during a low time in their lives. At LCP in 2024 we had 11,400 hours of chaplaincy services between our staff and badged volunteers working inside the prison.

Katie Harnish leads the LCP Chaplaincy department as Chaplaincy Coordinator. Jewel Sensenig handles the administrative office for the chaplain's office, which handles well over 11,000 inmate requests. Our chaplains handed out hundreds of Bibles and books and distributed over 900 Bible correspondence courses for inmates to complete. They also provided 2,700 one-on-one visits with inmates on the cell blocks. The chaplain's office arranged 1,650 visits for outside clergy to meet with inmates. There were 870 group studies conducted by chaplains and volunteers and our chaplains oversaw 500 worship services by outside church groups for inmates. One of the hardest parts of the chaplain's job is telling an inmate that a loved one is in the hospital or has passed away. The chaplain's office handled over 100 medical and death notifications. These numbers are staggering, and we are grateful to be able to serve God in this way.

At Youth Intervention Center our chaplains are under the guidance of Jeryl Zimmerman and did much of the same but on a much smaller scale. Also, our chaplains talked to over 500 young people last year. There were also over 300 services done by outside church groups.







Reaching beyond themselves

The Democratic Republic of Congo is home to nearly 200 000 Anabaptists who find their homes in four MWC national member churches.

In 2024, the Mennonite Brethren church (Communauté des Églises des Freres Mennonites au Congo) celebrated their centennial. Henk Stenvers (president) and Siaka Traoré (regional representative for Central/West Africa) represented MWC at the week-long festivities in August.

Reaching out beyond themselves, these brothers and sisters bless those who have been impacted by violence. For years, Congolese MBs have been hosting internally displaced people from conflicts in the Kasai region. Late in 2024, active fighting erupted again in eastern DRC where the CEFMC has congregations.

MWC supports CEFMC through calling the global family to prayer. As Anabaptist member churches and related agencies each respond according to their capacities and constituencies, MWC makes an impact by convening and coordinating the work to prevent duplication or omission.



The Courage to Love in a world on fire

We commemorate 500 years of Anabaptism in 2025 with a special event 29 May in Zurich. We pray that the boldness of our spiritual ancestors may inspire the courage we need to live as Jesus followers today.




LMC GRANTS

The LMC Grants Committee was able to support and award \$31,265 to 33 individuals to further their educational journeys and ministry opportunities in 2025.

- Sixteen of these individuals are STEP students.
- Seven are urban elementary students in Christian schools receiving tuition assistance.
- ▶ Five women received Quiet Shouts funds for ministry education.
- Seven requests were from persons pursuing higher education in seminaries and Bible schools.
- ▶ There were 3 Pastoral Health and Ministry grants for a training seminar, sabbatical funds, and support for international pastors to attend a conference.
